

**WELCOME:** We are delighted that you have enrolled in the American Birding Association's, Institute for Field Ornithology, Winter Sparrows of the Southwest Workshop. We look forward to sharing an exciting and informative week of learning and birding with you. Some details you may be wondering about are covered in the following information.

**WORKSHOP DESCRIPTION:** Southeastern Arizona is home to many resident species of breeding sparrows and a favored location for migrants to overwinter. We will visit semi-desert grasslands and riparian woodlands to observe the behavior and habitat selection of over 20 species of sparrows, towhees, and longspurs. Daily outings will be followed by classroom presentations on identification, vocalizations, ecology, natural history, and conservation. Potential highlights include Botteri's, Rufous-winged, Black-chinned, and Baird's Sparrows and Chestnut-collared and McCown's Longspurs. Other birds of interest that may be seen include Ferruginous Hawk, Scaled Quail, Bendire's Thrasher, and Mountain Plover.

**INSTRUCTOR:** Homer M. Hansen is the author of the G.I.S.S. Series bird identification guides and has been bird watching in the southwest since 1995. Homer is a native of Willcox, Arizona, and has been chairman of the annual Wings Over Willcox Birding & Nature Festival. He feels fortunate to have grown up surrounded by Sandhill Cranes in winter and Cassin's Sparrows in summer. Homer has given numerous workshops and tours on raptors, sparrows, flycatchers, warblers, bird vocalizations, and other aspects of bird ecology over the years and is a regular presenter and trip leader for Arizona birding festivals. He is also the course instructor for the Tucson Audubon Society's Moving to Mastery birding workshops.

**LOCATION:** Sierra Vista is situated in the heart of southeastern Arizona, one of the finest birding locations in the U.S. Southeastern Arizona is part of the Sky Islands, a region known for its rich diversity of bird species and habitats. Sierra Vista is located at the base of the Huachuca Mountains and is near several riparian corridors, grassland plains, and agricultural communities. Winter is an excellent time to observe many species of sparrow and longspur migrants that overwinter in this region in addition to the local resident breeders.

**WHAT TO EXPECT:** The workshop provides all ground transportation, lodging, and meals beginning and ending in Tucson. The workshop has both field trips and classroom sessions. The classroom sessions are comprehensive, and although handouts will be provided, notetaking may be beneficial. Wintertime in southeastern Arizona typically is very comfortable. During the winter months, the daytime temperatures may range from 50° to 70°F, with night temperatures often falling to near freezing or below. The days are typically sunny, but may be overcast, and wind or rain is possible if a front moves through. The workshop is limited to 6 participants with a minimum of 4 participants required.

**PHYSICAL REQUIREMENTS:** This workshop will require walking between two to four miles a day. We will walk up to two miles at a time, at a slow pace. Most of the walking will be done on level surfaces with little elevation gain, but some of the walking will be in grassland habitat and as the terrain may uneven, be sure to bring appropriate footwear with good traction. Gaiters or similar means for keeping grass and weed seeds out of pants, socks, and shoes are highly recommended.

#### **WHAT TO BRING:**

- Field gear (binoculars, camera, scope and tripod, etc.)
- Hat and sunscreen
- Container for water/drinks
- Layered clothing for cool mornings and moderate to warm days
- Comfortable and sturdy footwear for the field trips
- Gaiters for walking through grass/weeds
- Three-ring binder or clipboard
- Writing utensils and notebook
- Backpack or other carrying case

**TRAVEL INFORMATION:** Travel arrangements to and from Tucson International Airport (TUS) are your responsibility. Please plan your travel so that you will arrive at the Double Tree Suites in time for dinner and introductions at 6:00 PM on Thursday, January 18, 2018. The Double Tree Suites provides complimentary transportation to and from the airport. The shuttle runs 24-hours a day, call the hotel at (520) 225-0800 when you arrive in Tucson, and they will come pick you up at the baggage claim area. There is NOT a courtesy phone available.

**ACCOMMODATIONS:** All lodging is provided for the workshop. Lodging for arrival and departure will be at the Double Tree Suites in Tucson, Arizona. The remainder of the nights will be at Battiste Bed, Breakfast & Birds and/or Gasthaus Mountain View. Rooms are assigned based on occupancy. A supplement of \$320 is required for single occupancy. If you prefer to share but do not have a roommate and a roommate cannot be assigned, the single occupancy supplement will apply.

**TRANSPORTATION:** The Double Tree Suites will provide transportation from the Tucson International Airport (TUS) to the hotel and from the hotel back to the airport. During the workshop, transportation will be provided in one multi-passenger vehicle. Luggage will be transported in a separate vehicle to and from the hotel and Bed & Breakfast lodgings. All transportation will be provided between Bed & Breakfast lodgings as needed.

**MEALS:** All meals are provided for during the workshop from dinner on January 18 through breakfast on January 23. Meals include a full breakfast, a sack lunch, and dinner at a designated restaurant. The TYPICAL meal selections are as follows:

- Breakfasts typically include scrambled eggs, sausage or ham, hot and cold cereals, bagels or toast, fresh fruits, yogurt, coffee, tea, milk, and juice.
- Lunches are self-prepared after eating breakfast. Lunch makings provided typically include bread, a selection of meats, peanut butter, and other spreads, chips, fresh fruits, vegetables, and other sides.
- Dinners are at a designated restaurant and typically include a selection of 3 or 4 entrées (beef, chicken, pork, fish, and/or vegetarian) with a side dish, salad, and *non-alcoholic* drinks. A single desert selection may be available for the entire group.

**SMOKING POLICY:** Most of our workshop attendees prefer a smoke-free environment. If you smoke, please be sensitive to the group and refrain from smoking during group activities. Smoking is NOT permitted at the Bed & Breakfast lodgings.

**REGISTRATION & CANCELLATIONS:** Cost of the workshop is \$1,550 per person (a supplement of \$320 is required for single occupancy), please call (800) 850-2473 to register. A refund (minus \$150) will be given for cancellations more than 90 days before the workshop. Cancellations less than 90 days and more than 30 days before the workshop will forfeit 20% of the workshop fee. Cancellations less than 30 days before the workshop will forfeit 100% of the workshop fee unless the space is filled by another participant. All cancellations require a \$150 processing fee. With regard to cancellation of the workshop, the ABA is not responsible for any travel ticket fees or reimbursements due to workshop cancellation under any circumstance.
